Dr. Rick Smith gave the board an update regarding on-going meetings surrounding the EagleNet project. Susan Hakanson and Dr. Rick traveled to Denver on January 28th to meet with several parties connected to the project. They met with:

The same information and presentation was made to each group. Dr. Rick and Ms. Hakanson took the opportunity to listen and express the SWCCOG's desire to help the Eagle-Net project come to completion.

On Tuesday, January 29th, members of the SWCCOG Board, SCAN staff, elected officials and NTIA staff met to discuss the future of the Eagle-Net project. The conversation was productive and there is hope that some progress was made toward a positive end.

iii The board discussed penning a letter of support to the Forest Service for the EagleNet project as individual entities or as a SWCCOG. Jason stated that anything we can do on a positive note to push things along with Eaglenet, we should seize the opportunity in addressing the 160/550 route.

Susan/ Dr. Rick addressed a question about "Educational Fiber" in which the Forest Service does differentiate, and is concerned with ANY fiber going into the ground.

The board felt a SWCCOG letter was appropriate; in the letter they wanted us to be supportive of the proposed Eaglenet routes as well as alternatives.

Board has directed staff to move forward with letter of support.

B. Legislative Committee

The SWCCOG Legislative Committee met on Thursday, January 31 to discuss legislation that has been proposed to date in the Colorado state and senate that may have ramifications for out member entities. It was discussed that the SWCCOG should

communities and potentially for our larger ones as well, to bring in the CML/CCI perspective and host a training for our smaller communities.

The DoLA office of Smart Growth offers a "Planning 101" Training, where they come to your community and do the training with no cost associated. It is aimed toward staff, boards, and commissions.

Joe Kerby suggested staff work with LPC Planning Director Damian Peduto, who is putting together training for LPC commissioners this year. LPC is planning to offer one each quarter. Staff will be proposing the training plans at the next meeting. SWCCOG members were invited to join and Susan will coordinate with Damian to make sure we aren't duplicating services in the region.

The Board commented that commissioners may be more willing to accept the information if it comes from someone local. Look at moving quarterly meetings around the region, avoiding a La Plata- centric focus.

Staff also discussed the potential to look into shared services between communities; hiring someone to SWCCOG who serves multiple counties, specifically in IT, Engineering, etc. Ignacio is using LPC as building inspectors, which has been successful and significantly reduced the cost to community members.

Discussion of E-Rate: The SWCCOG's ability to serve school districts and other Tier II organizations was discussed. The school district was concerned about their ability to participate in the SCAN network without E-rate capabilities. Staff found out it would not preclude them from access to other funding from E-Rate.

- Maintenance is primary goal, we are NOT charging for service.
- SWCCOG does not want to be construed as a provider
- The SCAN has to provide open access out of the network, which providers have agreed to.
- Some concerns this may be against the spirit of the project in terms of aggregating demand and therefore connectivity.
- Concern for school districts as "non-viable, direct consumers"

GOAL:

To connect all municipalities in the region with a fiber network by maximizing the fiber investment made by the private sector, the Southwest Colorado Council of Governments (SWCCOG) and the federal government in southwest Colorado.

FACTS:

Southwest Colorado has challenging terrain for fiber projects whether buried or aerial installations are contemplated.

The local carriers have substantial investments in fiber routes throughout the southwest. The combined routes connect approximately 80% of the southwest (see attached map).

The SWCCOG has a \$4 million fiber investment with major funding coming from Colorado's Department of Local Affairs (DoLA) connecting the schools and government buildings in each of its member municipalities.

The local fiber loops connect the schools, libraries, municipal and county buildings together and bring them to a neutral location.

Many of the SWCCOG's smaller municipalities partnered with the local carriers to complete their local fiber loops through a collaborative effort.

STATUS:

The southwest local fiber carriers currently connect 80% of its municipalities though a system of fiber routes.

The southwest wireless carriers currently provide middle mile and last mile connectivity to customers with a backhaul services component as well.

Each of the SWCCOG member municipalities has scheduled or completed a local fiber loop connecting schools, libraries, municipal and county government buildings.

Eagle Net has installed empty conduit sporadically around the southwest, mainly in Montezuma and Dolores Counties.

COG Beliefs:

Oversight, transparency, accountability, and public access information are important components of all broadband development projects funded by tax payer's money.

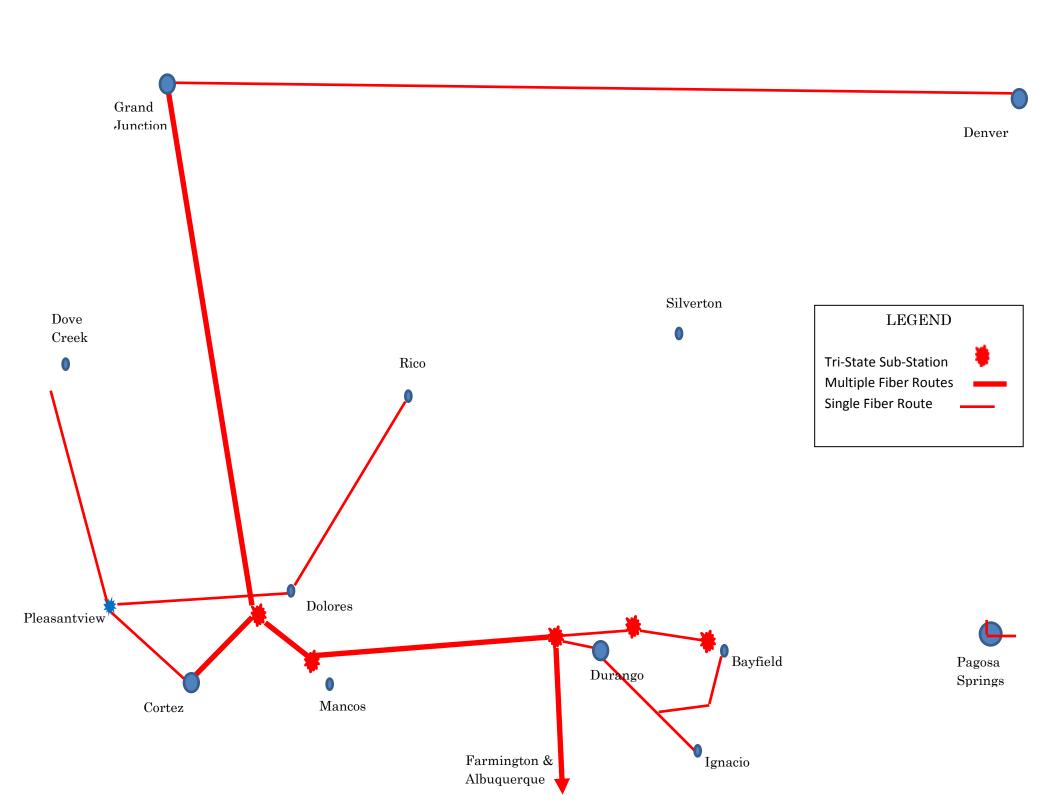
Public funds allocated for broadband development may be used to compensate for the lack of private broadband investment in unserved and underserved communities, such as rural areas and low-income areas.

The SWCCOG defines underserved as: The ability of an organization to continually utilize applications and tools to meet the organizational mission and goals. As applications are enhanced with a need for increased broadband capabilities and the current infrastructure cannot support the increased need, the area is deemed underserved.

OPTIONS:

The SWCCOG recognizes three plausible options for the NTIA and Eagle Net to complete the middle mile fiber network in the time allotted.

- 1) Eagle Net work cooperatively with the local providers to complete the middle mile fiber network utilizing local providers' assets currently installed. Elimination of duplicate/parallel fiber builds in order to maximize NTIA funding, local carrier investment and the DoLA funded SCAN project.
- 2) The SWCCOG assist NTIA and Eagle Net by facilitating a collaborative effort on Eagle Net's behalf between local carriers and NTIA to complete the middle mile fiber network utilizing local providers' assets currently installed. Elimination of duplicate/parallel fiber builds in order to maximize NTIA funding, local carrier investment and the DoLA funded SCAN project.
- 3) The SWCCOG and the local carriers collaborate to acquire the necessary funding to complete the middle mile fiber network utilizing local providers' assets currently installed. Elimination of duplicate/parallel fiber builds in order to maximize the funding, local carrier investment and the DoLA funded SCAN project.

To Whom It May Concern;

On behalf of the Board of the Southwest Colorado Council of Governments (SWCCOG), I am writing to you to voice support for approval of special use authorization for the Eagle-Net project. Completion of this project is important to our region and these two sections including US Highway 160 between South Fork and Durango, and the US Highway 550 from Durango to the Tri-State Cascade Village Sub-Station are areas that represent critical "middle mile" sections that are not now connected with fiber.

The SWCCOG, representing Archuleta, La Plata County, San Juan and Dolores Counties, as well as all 11 municipalities within the region are investing \$4 million dollars in broadband fiber systems, called the SCAN, that link the governmental buildings, and in some areas schools and libraries, within communities. The Eagle-Net project is an important link for this project between communities, allowing for efficient and effective communication for regional government.

Without Eagle-Net, neither Silverton/San Juan County, or Pagosa Springs/Archuleta County have broadband fiber connectivity. Because of our small population bases and remote communities, it is not cost effective for private industry to serve these communities. The Eagle-Net project, being built in part with a federal grant, is perhaps our only hope of reaching these populations with critical fiber connectivity.

The SWCCOG is working with Eagle-Net in the region to assist in any way we can to help bring this project to completion. We would support the plan as presented or alternate plans that might alleviate environmental concerns or better avoid sensitive areas.

In your packet are the December financial reports produced through Quick books for the SWCCOG. The first page is the Combined Balance Sheet by Class through December showing \$50,543.87 in total assets and net income of \$31,106.34.

The second sheet is the Profit/Loss Budget vs. Actual which shows that the SWCCOG was under budget by \$11,237. Each account is then outlined on the next pages. Most of the budget underage came in Fund #830 (\$31,436) as community requests for reimbursement prior to the end of the year was less than predicted.

There were questions at the last meeting regarding Fund #830. One was about the MidState invoice 1211-0075 for \$2,025.00, paid in December 2012. Details of this invoice were sent to Susan Hakanson, Bryce Capron and Dick White after the January 2013 meeting. The invoice period was 11/4/12-11/17/12 and related to MidState's transition report. Specifically the preparation of the summaries for the Self Performance Transition, which can all be found in the Dropbox.

The other question regarding Region 9 going over budget in their line item 5638. An explanation was also emailed to the SWCCOG Chair, Treasurer and Susan Hakanson since the last meeting. In summary, approval of the 2012 budget revision was needed at the December meeting, and all accounts needed to be estimated for the last two months of the year for the December Board packets. The final two months of Region 9 expenses were underestimated as month expenses for November and December were not in. Also, the budget preparation for revising 2012, and developing 2013, plus the report to DoLA took more time than anticipated.

Region 9 has a 3 year contract as part of the telecom grant for \$120,000. Region 9 bills the COG for their expenses associated with the grant. Most of the expense is in salaries. Region 9 then writes a check to the COG for 25% of the salaries as match. The grant reimburses the COG 75% of the salaries and Region 9 has paid the other 25%. Currently, Region 9 has been paid \$132,336 but has paid back to the COG \$32,626 for a net of \$99,710. Region 9 is still under the

\$120,000. Also, starting January of 2013 Region is matching 50% of salaries trying stretch out the remaining amount left on the contract and will not go over the \$120K.

The 2012 budget does not need to be further revised as long as the total fund expenses are not over budget. Specifically, any single budget line item overages are allowable, as state statue dictates that only the entire fund actual expenditures cannot exceed total budgeted expenditures. Region 9 staff has correspondence from our auditor, Todd Beckstead, explaining government requirements for over-budget expenditures. We also have information from the DOLA budgeting class confirming this explanation.

Other Financial Updates:

- SWCCOG dues notices were sent out in February.
- Cynthia Aspen met with Susan in February and reviewed financials, 2013 budget and other financial related information.

Fiscal Impact:

As referred to above.

Background: At the February meeting, the board made the following decisions regarding proposed legislation. Staff was directed to send communications on these bills, and Ron LeBlanc offered Sherri Dugdale as staff support to pen letters. Below is a quick update on these bills.

Oppose SB13-025, "Collective Bargaining Firefighters", This bill has passed through the senate and is in committee in the house. The Governor has stated that he would veto the bill if it was sent to him un-amended. We will continue to follow the bill.

Oppose HB13-1107, "Prohibit Collective Bargaining Public Employees". This bill has been Postponed Indefinitely.

Oppose HB13-1090, "Construction Contractor Subcontractor Prompt Pay". This bill is in its initial amendment phase and has not moved yet in committee.

Oppose HB13-1093, "Bidding for Local Government Procurement Contracts". This bill has been Postponed Indefinitely.

Support SB13-048, "Authorize Local Government Use of HUTF for Transit". This bill is through the Senate and has been introduced in the house.

Oppose SB13-023, Increase Damages Caps Under CGIA (contingent on CCI also opposing the bill). This bill has been heavily amended. CCI felt that it was reasonable to increase rates (as they had not been increased for 20 years), but that much of the rest of the bill was onerous.

From CCI -

The General Government Steering Committee of CCI discussed SB 23 during a meeting in January and county commissioners agreed that raising the damage caps was the responsible thing to do and that periodic inflationary adjustments would ensure that the public was adequately compensated in the future. Commissioners voiced concerns, however, about making the accrued interest exclusive of these damage caps. In cases where an appeal takes time to

work through the courts, the interest can actually end up being **more** than the original damage award itself. CCI voted to support reasonable increases to the damage caps and periodic adjustments in the future.

CCI has worked with the bill sponsors, the Colorado Municipal League, the Special District Association, the Colorado Trial Lawyers Association and other stakeholders to work out a deal that addresses the inequities in the current governmental immunity statute without unreasonably saddling local governments with additional exposure. Under the compromise, the damage caps would be raised to \$350,000 (for one person) and \$990,000 (for two or more persons) and these caps will be adjusted for inflation every four years. The exclusionary interest provision will be dropped under a proposed amendment to be offered during committee action on the bill.

CCI appreciates the willingness of Minority Leader Cadman and the majority leadership in both houses to work with local government stakeholders to find common ground on this important policy issue. The bill is scheduled to be heard in the Senate Judiciary Committee on Wednesday, February 27th, and CCI is planning to support the bill once amended.

This month was devoted to chasing down vendors to get estimates to give communities a chance to make decisions. We had one community drop out of the SCAN project but retain their membership in the COG.

COG

- > Continuing the building community notebooks for the COG and individual communities that cover the process for each fiber build along with maps check list and any other pertinent information.
- > Susan and I attended several different meetings in Denver to talk about Eagle Net. I reported this out at the last meeting but did not have it in my report last month.
 - We met with Senator Roberts, Geoff Wilson (DoLA legal council), Representive McLachlan (no show), Pete Kirchof (CTA), Tony Hernandez (DoLA), Mike Ryan (Eagle Net) and Brian (Governor's Office IT).
 - In each case we presented our local fiber map with the three options for completing Eagle Net's fiber network in the Southwest.
 - We set up the meeting between Eagle Net and our local carriers.
- > Subsequently I facilitated a meeting with local providers (USA Communications, Fasttrack Communications and Farmers Telco) and Eagle Net representatives (Mike Ryan (CEO), Chip White and Pat Swonger) in Durango to discuss a collaborative approach to helping Eagle Net. Ken Charles and Susan Hakanson also attended the meeting.
 - The carriers shared the fiber route map that they put together for Eagle Net.
 - Mr. Ryan and Mr. White reviewed their map on a computer but did not share with the group.

5.A i – GM Report

- We discussed all the fiber routes for the entire region including every community. We highlighted the communities missing fiber and explored which carrier could assist with that fiber construction (either through IRU or new construction).
- Mr. Ryan appeared to be very receptive to working with all three carriers.
- I sent an e-mail to all parties recounting the meeting with the outcomes that were decided.
- I will send weekly e-mails to that group requesting updates until the fiber network connecting all of our communities is complete.
- ➤ I am facilitating discussions with the IT staffs of Cortez, Durango and La Plata County to build the logical network. This is the piece that will allow COG members to communicate with each other (by department).
- A second public safety meeting was hosted by La Plata County with law enforcement representatives from across the region.
 - We had better regional participation including several of the smaller communities and counties.
- > Provided updates on Eagle Net collaborative progress with local carriers to state and federal entities.

① Mancos -

- ✓ I met with the interim Town Manager to discuss the project and work through any issues.
- ✓ She is ready to receive the Mancos notebook and proceed forward.

② Ignacio -

- The Town is ready for the aerial build from the school fiber line to the Town shop. Their project will complete with funds left over.
- We will attempt to get this build completed first as it requires no trenching.

Background: A complete and signed copy of the DoLA EIA grant was received last month and staff is preparing to initial documents to move forward to complete the project objectives.

1. PROJECT DESCRIPTION, OBJECTIVES AND REQUIREMENTS

The Project consists of partially financing community and economic development projects for the Southwest Colorado Council of Governments (SWCCOG) ("Contractor"). The SWCCOG consists of local governments in state planning Region 9.

The community and economic development projects include:

- 1. In collaboration with a qualified consultant(s), produce a Broadband operations and business plan, needed agreements, memoranda of understanding (MOUs) or intergovernmental agreements (IGAs) and recommended policies for the Southwest Colorado Access Network (SCAN). The SWCCOG received a \$3.0 million grant to construct a local government, regional broadband infrastructure network (SCAN). This project will help ensure the sustainability and maintenance of the network by developing a business model, plan and agreements to operate and maintain the system that is comprised of the various community systems. SWCCOG's goal is for the SCAN to be self-sufficient and operate as an enterprise.
- 2. In collaboration with a qualified consultant(s), facilitate a discussion between SWCCOG members and staff that will help determine the best use of SWCCOG efforts and resources.
- 3. In coordination with the regional housing organizations, the regional transit providers in the southwest and the regional senior services providers in the southwest, develop a database of services, develop and select priorities and produce a web based information system and develop a strategic plan for the SWCCOG and its individual members as it relates to these three service areas (collectively referred to as "Southwest Connect").

Eligible project expenses include consultant services. Salary and benefit costs for SWCCOG staff for documented hours directly spent on the projects listed above will be provided by Grantee as in-kind contribution. A contract for the consultant services shall be awarded to a qualified firm through a formal RFP or competitive selection process.

Energy and Mineral Impact Assistance program funds in the amount of <u>FIFTY THOUSAND AND XX/100</u> Dollars (\$50,000.00) are provided under this Contract to finance Project costs. The Contractor shall provide <u>FIFTY TWO THOUSAND AND XX/100</u> Dollars (\$52,000.00) in Project financing from sources other than State funds, and, in any event, is responsible for all Project cost in excess of <u>FIFTY THOUSAND AND XX/100</u> Dollars (\$50,000.00). The Contractor expects to provide both a cash contribution as well as in-kind labor. The value of the in-kind labor is \$32,000.00. The Contractor is required to document the time and value of the in-kind labor.

1. Dr. Rick and Ms. Hakanson will move forward with all SCAN documents and agreements necessary to move the project toward self-sufficiency. Ms. Hakanson's time spent specifically on this project, (as paid by La Plata County), will be used directly as matching funds for the grant.

- 2. Ms. Hakanson, working with regional directors will move toward a sustainability plan. Ms. Hakanson's time spent specifically on this project, (as paid by La Plata County), will be used directly as matching funds for the grant.
- 3. Ms. Hakanson is prepared to release RFP's for contractors to complete the necessary projects related to the regional housing priority. RHA has received a grant to participate in this project and working in partnership with SWCCOG will add \$32,000 in matching funds, other funding is being sought through additional partners.

Fiscal Impact: This grant brings \$50,000 directly to the SWCCOG budget, with \$52,000 being added in matching funds by other funders, and in in-kind donation by LPC of Susan Hakanson's time, as well as by other regional staff working on specific SWCCOG initiatives.

Recommended Action: Give staff direction to move forward with the specific projects of the DoLA Grant.

Reallocation of SCAN Grant Funds

In the event that one or more of the local government partners declines to participate in the SCAN Grant project in full or in part, the funds not utilized for that local government's project may be utilized by other member organizations to expand their own community projects. This will require the participating community receiving the reallocated funds to increase their local match accordingly to include the construction match and regional administration match allocated to those funds they will receive. The reallocation of the grant funds will require a recalculation of the administrative match percentage tied to the transferred funds.

Requests to utilize those funds which are to be reallocated will come to the Southwest Colorado Council of Governments (SWCCOG) Telecom Committee for first review, discussion and, in the case of multiple requests, prioritization.

The requests will include a complete history of any grant funds utilized to date, estimates for the proposed project(s) in the request, specific information regarding how the project will benefit the community and / or the SCAN project as a whole, a timeline for completion.

Requests or a prioritized list of requests will be presented to the SWCCOG Board for consideration and approval.

Priorities will be based on:

- a. Member organization has met current grant requirements,
- b. Member organization can meet match requirement,
- c. Funds will be used to fill in shortfall needed to complete original project scope,
- d. Project proposed can meet the grant deadline, (Detailed plan and time-line to be submitted)
- e. Member organization can demonstrate need for additional funds.





Advanced Telecommunications Systems Network Policy

Mission Statement

The Mission of the Southwest Colorado Access Network "SCAN" is to:

Implement a regional telecommunications network that provides infrastructure to enable public offices to connect to one another within a community, and aggregate demand to purchase telecommunications services more effectively. This will enable public offices throughout the region to network and aggregate their service delivery.

Vision Statement

Local public offices control their own telecommunications destiny with a private network supported by publicly owned infrastructure on an open access network model that provides very high speed transmission and large amounts of bandwidth at reasonable costs. The network provides the ability to aggregate demand among community public offices that further enhances the ability to acquire telecommunications services on the most cost effective and efficient basis possible. The availability of excess capacity within an open access network model enables the private sector to extend advanced telecommunications systems access and services to businesses and residents into areas where previously not financially feasible.

Description of Regional Network Architecture

The Southwest Colorado Access Network (SCAN) will build a state of the art telecommunications network supported by publicly-owned or leased infrastructure to provide secure connections between participating community public offices including: government, education, law enforcement, search and rescue, medical facilities, and others.

The regional network will provide connectivity for Southwest Colorado Council of Governments (SWCCOG) members ranging from Pagosa Springs on the east, to Dove Creek on the west. The regional network will include two hub locations for the outlying communities and colleges to connect. The two regional hubs (Durango and Cortez) will be connected via a system that allows for secure traffic to flow from all areas of the region, utilizing the applications and systems necessary, without the issues of degrading the signal. Each community will build an intra-community network to aggregate services at a common point. Aggregation of demand region-wide is a major goal of the project. Where feasible, each community aggregation point will connect to one or both of the regional hub sites. Upstream connectivity will be from the regional hubs, or from community aggregation points for communities where connectivity to the regional hub is infeasible.

Inter- and intra-community SCAN network segments may be: new construction executed by the SWCOG members; new construction executed by private carriers in partnership with the SWCCOG members; leased services from private carriers; or other deployments. High capacity connectivity at reasonable operational costs is the hallmark of the project. When feasible, fiber connectivity is preferred, but copper and wireless services will be considered where fiber deployment proves to be unrealistic.

The regional network will provide services for local governments. Furthermore, excess capacity in a logically separate open access / open services network will be made available for private service providers to utilize. Providing an open access / open services model is a requirement of the original DoLA grant funding. Logical service provider connections throughout the network should be accommodated.

Beliefs:

- The Southwest Colorado region that makes up the district of the SWCCOG is rural in nature, with
 populations that are often isolated from necessary services and infrastructure such as adequate
 advanced telecommunications systems. Not having access to advanced telecommunications
 systems service or adequate advanced telecommunications systems service and applications
 limit institutions, individuals and businesses from participating fully in the nation's economy,
 democracy, culture and society.
- Economic growth and educational development in southwest Colorado depend in large part on the range and quality of telecommunications services available to public and private institutions, businesses and residents.
- By aggregating demand in each participating community and throughout the region, SCAN will
 offer faster speeds, greater throughput, and the ability to deliver services in an efficient and
 cost-effective manner to SWCCOG members including, but not limited to: data transfer,
 application sharing, digital telephony, and other advanced digital services.
- Public funds allocated for advanced telecommunications systems development may be used to compensate for the lack of private advanced telecommunications systems investment in unserved and underserved communities, such as rural areas and low-income areas.
- Public funding should prioritize reaching communities that do not have access to advanced telecommunications systems, rather than rebuilding or overbuilding existing networks.
- Oversight, transparency, accountability, and public access information are important components of all advanced telecommunications systems development projects funded by tax payer's money.

Un-Served or Underserved

Un-served or Underserved can be defined by the following:

- 1. No service is currently available.
- 2. Cost of advanced telecommunications systems service currently available is 10% or higher than that of comparable service in a similar service area.
- 3. Current speeds available fail to allow organizations to utilize the applications necessary to conduct business.
- 4. Organization has no access to advanced telecommunications systems services due to hardware limitations.

When seeking public funds to service an organization, the SCAN entity should strive to:

- Partner with private or non-profit service provider where possible and assist that provider in extending infrastructure to the organization to achieve optimal advanced telecommunications systems services;
- 2. Work with the service provider to ensure advanced telecommunications systems are available at an affordable rate for the target organization;
- 3. Work with service provider to ensure advanced telecommunications systems are available at optimal speeds for the targeted organization.

SCAN Access and Users

First Tier:

The first priority of the SCAN project is the advanced telecommunications systems connectivity of the SWCCOG membership.

First Tier users include all member entities in good standing at the time of the grant project agreement.

First Tier organizations have full access to benefits and full participation in revenue and cost sharing.

Second Tier:

Second Tier users include all other governmental organizations such as special districts, and "other political sub-divisions under the State" to include public school districts.

 Access as participants in the purchasing consortium, as deemed appropriate by partnering local SWCCOG member organization;

Or

- Access to the SCAN infrastructure only through a separate service provider.
- No revenue sharing is available to Second Tier organizations.

Third Tier:

Third Tier organizations include all other users including Non-Profit Organizations and Private Enterprise. The SCAN network may deliver dark fiber for third tier connection to the network infrastructure only through a separate service provider.

- No cost sharing is available to Third Tier organizations.
- No revenue sharing is available to Third Tier organizations.

In the case where no private or non-profit service provider can or will offer advanced telecommunications systems service within a acceptable time frame to un-served or underserved organizations or populations, the SCAN reserves the right to extend advanced telecommunications systems access directly as allowable by state law.

General Operations

Member organizations are encouraged to utilize the SCAN Network to collaborate with other member organizations to share services or software, and to offer any such collaboration to all member organizations.

If the member organizations wish that agreements be developed, software or services researched or developed or administered by SCAN staff, an administrative fee will be required, based on actual usage and cost. If the member organizations wish to support and administer the project, they will do so with their own staff and at no additional payment to the SCAN administration.

If a community chooses to release funds back to the SWCCOG for other communities or if a community elects to use additional DoLA grant funds, it's administration fee will be adjusted accordingly. Any funds released will be reallocated in accordance with the SWCCOG Reallocation Policy. For funds from the 2010 DoLA grant, communities must agree to utilize funds or request return for reallocation by March 31, 2013.

SCAN Operation Fees

To operate and maintain the SCAN, a system of fees will be negotiated on a bi-annual basis. This negotiation will take place in September finalized in October in odd number years to reflect the actual cost of operating and maintaining the system.

Fees will be based on:

Ramp Fee (Connectivity Fee)

- Fee covers Network maintenance (staff hours and fiber).
- Ramp Fee is to be paid by all "original SCAN participants", consisting of member organizations
 or other entities who use(d) the DoLA funds to build or connect to the SCAN who connect to the
 SCAN Network.
- This fee will be re-evaluated bi-annually to determine what is necessary for maintenance. At such a time that this fee is no longer needed to maintain the system, the fee will be reduced or eliminated.

Internet Bandwidth Usage

- Fee covers cost of Internet & Transport (port fees).
- SCAN General Manager will determine usage fee per term of lease based on real cost.

Internet Admin Fee

- Fee covers cost of routers & equipment.
- Leased Assets

Revenue from fiber IRU's with vendors. If the member organizations wish that agreements be developed, and services researched or developed or administered by SCAN staff, an administrative fee will be required. Fees paid for SCAN administration will be based on a 5% of gross revenue, with additional fees negotiated as needed on the bi-yearly fees resolution schedule.

• Direct payment for service from SWCCOG Members.

Other

 Payment for services from SWCCOG members (such as: credit card payment systems, voice systems, admin costs on joint projects etc.).

Fiber Repair Fund

A fiber repair fund is to be developed utilizing budget funds. This fund shall hold a minimum of 8% of the total operational costs, and not to exceed 16 %. Once the fund is established, the overall cost to members to fund the SCAN will be reduced. This fund is to be used to cover expenses in the case of damage or destruction of the SCAN fiber system, hardware and software. These funds are intended to be used for the immediate repair, and will be replaced as quickly as possible by the member organization utilizing the fund.



Resolution 13-03

Resolution to Adopt the SWCCOG SCAN Fee Schedule for 2013-2014

WHEREAS, the Southwest Colorado Council of Governments (SWCCOG) received a 3 million dollar grant to connect all municipalities and counties in the region with a fiber network (SCAN); and

WHEREAS, the member entities of the SWCCOG agreed to a 25% match of grant funds to complete the network; and

WHEREAS, the \$4 million dollar investment will facilitate the connectivity with a series of fiber loops that will be owned by the member jurisdiction where the fiber is located; and

WHEREAS, the fiber connection will allow member jurisdictions to collaborate, share services and products, and to aggregate services and products; and

WHEREAS, the fiber connection will be utilized jointly, with shared equipment and with the potential of shared services; and

WHEREAS, some accumulated maintenance and repair of common elements such as switches and other devices will need to be coordinated and completed; and

WHEREAS, some services and products will need to be developed, coordinated, and otherwise facilitated; and

WHEREAS, a cost sharing model to operate and maintain the network will be utilized, and a system of fees will be negotiated on a bi-annual basis. This negotiation will take place in September, and will be finalized in October in odd number years to reflect the actual cost of operating and maintaining the system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY the Board of Directors of the SWCCOG, Colorado:

That the SWCCOG's SCAN fee schedule in Exhibit A be adopted.

Ramp Fee (Connectivity Fee) \$75.00 per month or \$900.00 per year

- Ramp Fee is to be paid by all "original SCAN participants," consisting of member organizations or other entities who use(d) the DoLA funds to build or connect to the SCAN.
- Ramp Fees will be paid by any original SCAN participants that connect to the SCAN Network.
- This fee will be re-evaluated bi-annually to determine what is necessary for maintenance. At such a time that this fee is no longer needed to maintain the system, the fee will be reduced or eliminated.

Internet Bandwidth Usage - \$2.50 dollars per Mg.

- Fee covers cost of Internet & Transport (port fees).
- SCAN General Manager will determine usage fee per term of lease based on real cost.

Internet Admin Fee - \$1.50 Dollars per Mg.

• Fee covers cost of routers & equipment.

Leased Assets

Revenue from fiber IRU's with vendors. If the member organizations wish that agreements be developed, and services researched or developed or administered by SCAN staff, an administrative fee will be required. Fees paid for SCAN administration will be based on 5% of revenue, with additional fees negotiated as needed on the biannual fees resolution schedule.
